10 to 16 years-old who read for pleasure do better at school.



What is literacy?


 Literacy is the ability to read, write, speak and listen in a way that lets us communicate effectively and make sense of the world.



• Media literacy


• Media literacy is the ability to access, analyse, evaluate, and create media.

Media literate students are better able to understand the complex messages we receive from television, radio, Internet, newspapers, magazines, books, billboards, video games, music, and all other forms of media.




• Financial literacy

• Financial literacy is the ability to understand how money works in the world: how someone manages to earn or make it, how that person manages it, how he/she invests it (turn it into more) and how that person donates it to help others.




• Cultural literacy

The culturally literate person is able to talk to and understand others of that culture with fluency, to understand differing values and communicate as a global citizen.




• Scientific literacy

• Scientific literacy is the knowledge and understanding of scientific concepts and processes required for personal decision making, participation in cultural affairs, and economic productivity.




• Information literacy •

Information literacy is a set of abilities requiring individuals to "recognize when information is needed and have the ability to locate, evaluate, and use effectively the needed information."




• Digital literacy •
