




Connecting honesty to Show Racism the Red Card and

Honesty: A Foundation for Living



This verse from the Old Testament reminds us that honesty isn't just about avoiding lies—it's about being trustworthy in all we do.

When we speak truth and act with integrity, we build relationships based on respect and trust.

Honesty requires courage, especially when the truth is difficult to share, but it's essential for creating communities where everyone feels valued and safe

Bible Story: Joseph's Honesty in Egypt (Genesis 41)

Joseph, once sold into slavery by his brothers, ended up in prison in Egypt. But he stayed honest, even when things were hard. When Pharaoh had strange dreams, Joseph truthfully interpreted them, giving God the credit. Because of his honesty and wisdom, Pharaoh made Joseph the second most powerful man in Egypt!

Lesson:

Joseph's honesty and integrity opened doors to opportunity and leadership. Being honest—even when it's tough—can build trust and lead to great things.

Show Racism the Red Card was established in January 1996, thanks in part to a donation by then Newcastle United goalkeeper Shaka Hislop.

In 1990s Newcastle, Shaka was at a petrol station near St James' Park when he was confronted with a group of young people shouting racist abuse at him. After one of the group realised that they had been shouting at Shaka Hislop, the Newcastle United football player, they came over to ask for an autograph.
