“Sorry I didn't follow the rules.”

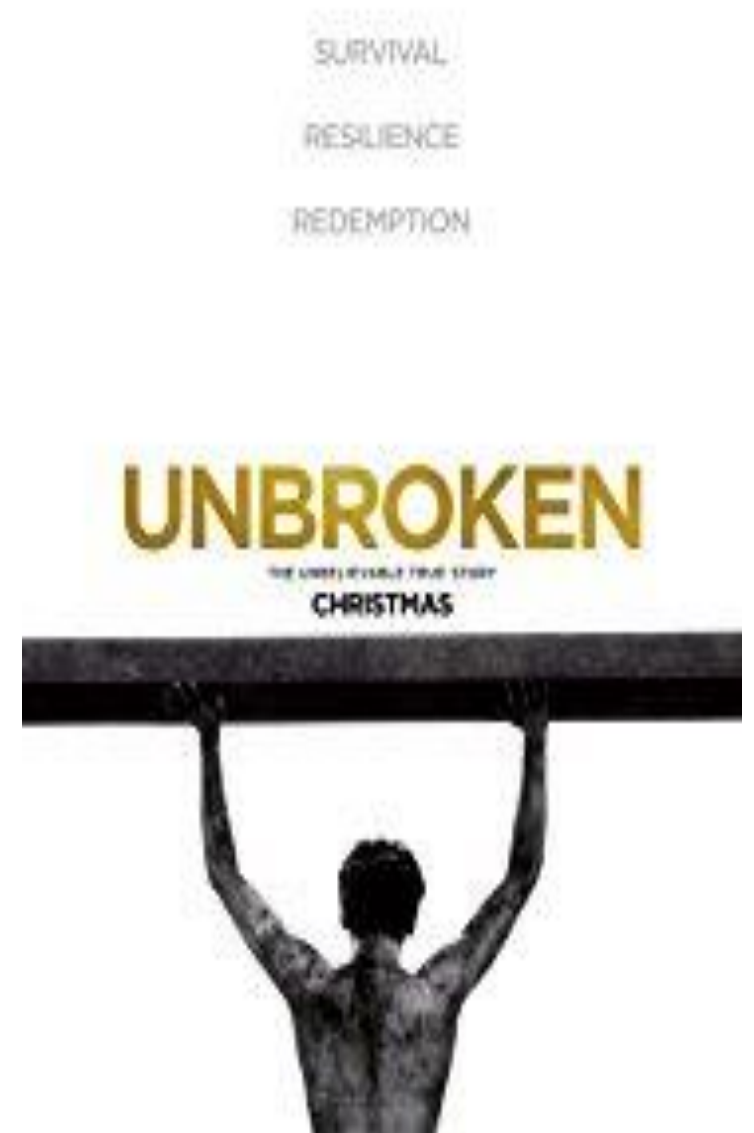
Unbroken (2014)

The movie 'Unbroken' is based on a real-life story following Louis Zamperini and how he forgave those that hurt him and almost tortured him to death.

After a near-fatal plane crash in WWII, Olympian Louis Zamperini spends a harrowing 47 days in a raft with two fellow crewmen before he's caught by the Japanese navy and sent to a prisoner-of-war camp.

Unbroken (2014)

- If you were in Zamperini's position, would you have forgiven those people who tortured him?
- Why do you think he forgave them?
- How do you think this affected Zamperini's life?
- If you were in his position, how would you feel?

Although people can hurt us, we should learn to forgive them and be the bigger person. It can be hard to forgive them, but you'll benefit from it.

Moral of the story

- We can be in denial most of the time. Whenever we have arguments with people we may refuse to believe that we may be in the wrong.
- An argument may be created by one person, but it takes two or more people to carry it on.
- In some situations, we need to realise that forgiving people and saying sorry can help us move on from a bad situation.
- We should say sorry when we have done something that badly affects you and someone else. However, we say it daily for small things, so why not say it for a big thing?

Discussion:

- Turn to the person next to you and ask them why they would say sorry to someone
- Discuss some situations where it is appropriate to say sorry.
- Would you forgive someone if they said sorry?
