## Safeguarding

A few days ago, I read an article in the news about period poverty and how it can impact school children. This problem has increased for many school children as the cost of living crisis continues.

The news article below found that 22% of children struggle to access basic period protection. This week we have placed posters in the girls' toilets to highlight this issue and provide signposting to seek help if they need to. To read the full article please see below.

The government initiative, Period Products Scheme, ensures stidents receive period products when they need them by providing access to tampons and pads if students can't afford them, have forgotten to bring them in or perhaps have come on their period unexpectedly. We wouldn't want any of our students to experience a lack of period protection, or to miss schooling due to not being able to afford the basics or if they feel embarrassed about asking. We will be highlighting how we can support students with period protection through posters in toilets and on form room displays to ensure our students know where they can go to ask for help.

An article in Wales Online found 'A study of 2,500 parents of girls who menstruate, aged eight to 18, found period poverty is the reality for many, who can't always provide for their children during their time of the month. As many as 34 per cent say their daughter has left for school without the necessary supplies, while 14 per cent have taken the day off to avoid any embarrassment'

Parents, please speak to your children about this and share that we are here to support them and we will ensure we do as our posters say, 'We promise to be discreet!'

## **Geography Field trip**

The first GCSE Geography field trip took place in early September this year with Year 11 students visiting Waltonon-the-Naze in north Essex. The data collected and fieldwork experience will be used to answer questions in their GCSE exam.

The main study sites included Walton-on-the-Naze town and a section of beach to the north near the historic Naze Tower. Students conducted environmental quality surveys which will be used to assess the impact of tourism and then measured the drop height of the sand on either side of the groynes to find out how the hard engineering is affecting the process of longshore drift. This was in addition to field sketches, photos and beach profiling.

Ms Wilkinson, Curriculum Leader for Geography said, "We had a wonderful time putting theory into practice in an unfamiliar location. The coastline we studied has incredible natural features and controversial coastal management. It's a great place for a GCSE field trip."


